

Why You Should Add A Loved One To Your Trico Account

As a not-for-profit electric cooperative, Trico cares about our Members and is always looking out for you. We want to make you aware of some of our rules and regulations that could ease your burden should a loved one pass away.

Whether you are a spouse, partner, sibling or child of a Trico Member, being added to the Trico Account has many benefits, including Membership Equity. It also gives you access to the account and the ability to pay the bill if necessary or make changes to the account. Adding someone to the account is free and will save your loved ones a lot of stress.

When a Trico Member passes away, if the surviving spouse/partner is not on the account, the service will have to be transferred to their name. There are fees to transfer service. A \$50 establishment fee will be added to the first month's bill. You may also have to pay a deposit, which is two times the average monthly bill.

Giving permission for someone to talk about your account is not the same as adding them to the account. To be added to the account, you need to fill out the Joint Membership form and have it notarized. We can email or mail the form to you. We can notarize the form at no cost to you; just call us first to make sure one of our notaries is in the office.

If a member of your household requires life sustaining equipment, you need to fill out the Life-Sustaining Equipment Form, which is available on our website at trico.coop/outages or we can email or mail it to you. The form must be signed by a physician. Life support equipment does not release the Member from financial obligations.

Did you know that you can have your bill sent to a seasonal address? If you are usually gone from May to October, you can set it up for your bill to automatically be mailed to your seasonal address. A copy of your bill can also be sent to another billing address if someone else pays the bill.

At least once a year, Members should make sure their contact information – phone and email – is accurate. We recommend that you add all your household phone numbers to the account so we can reach you in an emergency. You can change your contact information in SmartHub or call us at 520-744-2944.



Data centers: A strategic opportunity for Trico Members

Last month, Trico Electric Cooperative celebrated our 80th year with a look back at all we accomplished in 2025. As Trico starts its 81st year, I want to look forward to an issue that will be important for Trico in 2026 and for years to come: data centers.

I recognize there are concerns about data center development in our communities. Questions about water usage, community impact, and whether these projects benefit local residents are important. From an energy perspective, there is no denying that data centers are a significant challenge, an important challenge that utilities across the country are working to solve. At Trico, we look at the issue through the lens of our mission and our commitment to providing all our Members with cost-effective and sustainable energy solutions. As a cooperative, we work to reliably serve all loads in our territory, but we also have an obligation to do so on terms that protect and benefit all our Members.

That's why our Member-elected Board developed a rigorous framework that establishes exactly how we work with data centers. We are laser-focused on protecting the Membership from financial and reliability risks, and we see benefits that can be gained for our entire Membership if and when these projects move forward.

The first question we have heard from Members is: will data centers increase Members' energy costs? It is true that in many places data centers have increased costs. However, Trico is different

for two reasons: 1) we are a not-for-profit cooperative; and 2) we plan to assign all costs, including power supply.

As not-for-profit cooperative our purpose is to serve our Members. When it comes to power supply, we are different than many utilities because we lock in generation resources and contracts in advance to cover our Members' load. This minimizes the number of purchases we make on the energy market. This allows us to separate our existing Member power supply costs into one bucket and put the cost of power supply for a data center into a different bucket (that will be paid for by the data center). This provides protection for Trico Members.

To further protect our Members financially, we will require contractual commitments that any large data center pays 100% upfront for all distribution and transmission infrastructure. They also pay for all system impact studies. Importantly, they also receive direct assignment of generation costs and the expense to develop, build, and maintain additional generation resources. If the cost to build or buy new resources to serve them exceeds the existing generation costs built into our rates, the data center pays that difference—not our other Members. This protects our Members, our community, and the financial health of our cooperative.

How can Members benefit? Data centers consume electricity 24/7. When they pay all transmission and distribution infrastructure costs, those costs do not spread across the Membership. Then, as data centers pay rates that reflect the true cost of serving the load, this creates a margin for the cooperative, and this benefits all Members. This margin can actually defer the need for rate increases for the entire cooperative.

Your Trico Board has been proactive, strategic, and focused on protecting Members. The result is an opportunity to make the challenge of data centers into a benefit that works for Trico Members. That's the cooperative difference.

The FREE food is received from Caring Ministries in Tucson, Volunteers box the food inside the Main Sanctuary, and distribute the boxes to the community folks of Robles Junction/Three Points.



Maintenance

- Prune any dormant deciduous trees and shrubs you missed in January. Although no pruning is necessary for citrus trees, remove dead and diseased wood as well as crisscrossing limbs if the danger of frost has passed. Refer to [Pruning Deciduous Shade Trees](#) and [Pruning Citrus](#).
- Watch for cold temperatures—both night and day—and protect plants as needed. Refer to [Frost Protection](#) and [Protecting a Citrus Tree from Cold](#).
- Leave frost damage on plants until the danger of freezing has completely passed. Pruning too early exposes vulnerable plants unnecessarily and may encourage new growth that is even more frost-sensitive. Check your irrigation system for leaks caused by freezing temperatures and repair them. Refer to [Drip Irrigation: The Basics](#).
- If you did not prune established roses earlier, do so early in the month. Discard all potentially diseased, dropped leaves and cuttings—do not leave them under the plants or compost them. Healthy leaves are OK to compost. Refer to [Diagnosing Problems of Roses in the Landscape](#).
- Cut back native grasses, such as Muhlenbergia species (Muhly grass), to about 4 to 6 inches high before new growth starts. Cutting to this height removes dead and brown blades of grass and allows for new green growth. Native grasses also do not require soil amendments or fertilizer.
- Plan and prepare your summer garden layout, and rotate the location of certain vegetables if needed. Keeping a garden journal can help track these details. Refer to [Planning Your Vegetable Garden](#).
- Successful vegetable and annual flower gardens require amending the soil each planting cycle. The goal is to have loose, fertile, well-drained soil for these specialty gardens.
 - Prepare garden soils for spring planting of vegetables and annual flowers. Improving soil structure creates favorable conditions for seed germination and root growth. Refer to [Ten Steps to a Successful Vegetable Garden](#).
 - Recommended amendments include compost, composted manure, and worm castings. These add essential nutrients and promote beneficial biological life in the soil. Adding perlite and vermiculite improves aeration and drainage.
 - Do not add wood ash, crushed eggshells, or gypsum to the soil. Wood ash raises soil alkalinity, crushed eggshells are unnecessary, and gypsum is not recommended for local gardening conditions. Refer to [Fertilizing Home Gardens in Arizona](#).
- Winter rains bring weeds, so begin scouting for and manually removing them as soon as they appear.
- Look for aphids—they thrive in cooler temperatures and on new growth. They may also appear on plants other than roses. Refer to [Aphids](#) and [Diagnosing Problems of Roses in the Landscape](#).
- Now is a good time to plan or install active or passive rainwater harvesting. Refer to [Harvesting Rainwater for](#)

[Landscape Use](#) and [Landscape Management Practices to Optimize Passive Rainwater Harvesting and Plant Health](#).

Planting

- Harvest cabbage and cauliflower. Monitor lettuce for signs of bolting. If they bolt, consider saving seeds for next year or donating them to the [Pima County Seed Library](#).
- Sow annual seeds outdoors or plant starts for black-eyed Susan, fleabane, gaillardia, gloriosa daisy, Mexican sunflower, nasturtium, primrose, and sunflower.
- Plant perennials such as autumn sage, butterfly weed, chuparosa, damianita, desert mallow, desert milkweed, lavender, moss verbena, and pineleaf milkweed. Refer to [Flower Planting Guide for the Low Desert](#).
- Plant bare-root roses near the end of the month. Refer to [Rose Selection and Planting in the Low Desert](#).
- Continue harvesting most varieties of oranges and citrus. Refer to [Oranges for Southern Arizona](#) and [Grapefruit and Pummelo for Southern Arizona](#).

Fertilizing

- Continue with mild fertilizing of winter vegetables.
- Fertilize citrus—this is the first of three annual feedings. For oranges, tangerines, and grapefruit, apply one-third of the total in January or February, one-third in March or April, and one-third in May or June. For lemons and limes, the first two applications are the same, but the last one-third isn't until August or September. Refer to [Diagnosing Home Citrus Problems](#) and [Citrus Fertilization Chart for Arizona](#).
- Overseeded Bermuda grass lawns need applications of a nitrogen fertilizer once per month. Refer to [A Turfgrass Maintenance Guide for Residential and Commercial Lawns in the Low Elevation Arizona Desert](#).
- Other uses of fertilizer are not advised. Fertilizers stimulate new growth that will be frost-sensitive.

Watering

- February rainfall is normally about an inch. If your yard receives significant rain, adjust the amount of water you are supplying your plants. Change only the frequency—not the duration.
- Test your irrigation system for leaks and problems.
- Do not irrigate cacti, agave, yucca, and desert trees and shrubs through the end of the month.


